Former state president FW De Klerk's death leaves many questions unanswered

The Al Jama-ah was one of the first political parties to have accepted the acknowledgement and unconditional apology of former President FW De Klerk for the harm caused to the previously oppressed masses.

Heads of businesses, the Commerce, big law firms, other industries and especially Afrikaners must do the same and pay reparations at a higher rate than what Germany had to pay to its Western allies. They must clear South Africa's debt which the Minister of Finance Enoch Godongwana referred to in his policy statement on the medium term budget.

This is a minimum requirement which must be funded by the wealth accumulated over generations due to the crimes committed against the oppressed masses. The funding must be accrued for the benefit of residents in South Africans.

The oppressed people of South Africa will remember him as the last President of Apartheid South Africa. Although he was courageous under much pressure to release President Nelson Mandela and other leaders of the liberation movements, we remain concerned that members from the Pan Africanist Congress of Azania (PAC) remained in prison despite their "crimes" committed were politically motivated.

We take heed of the frantic efforts from the families of victims killed during the anti-apartheid struggle who want to see justice for their loved ones. Families of the Cradock 4 and many others will never know the truth about the murders of their husbands and fathers.

We further note that the perpetrators of crimes against humanity and those killed by the apartheid security police were never punished or held accountable for their brutal actions.
